

## A car is an investment. So the paint job should protect it... not just make it look pretty.

In Sweden, where winter can last from October to April, a Volvo can be under snow and on top of slush much of the time. That's when a paint job really has to shine, keeping moisture and raw salt off the body metal to prevent rust and corrosion. A new Volvo painting process, introduced with our 1973 cars, is designed to do this job better than ever before.

Instead of dipping the body in a primer bath, we now completely submerge it. The primer, which is electrically charged negatively, leaps on to the body which is electrically charged positively. The result; a thick, even coat of protection grips every square inch of body metal outside **and** inside, where corrosion usually begins.

Then the body is baked, sanded by hand and inspected by hand and eye (inspectors wearing flannel gloves feel out any imperfections not visible to the naked eye). This is followed by a second sealer coat, and more baking, sanding and inspecting.

Then come the color and finish coats. Followed by baking and a final inspection in the paint shop. But that's not the final inspection. The paint job is examined again at the end of the assembly line. And by your Volvo dealer before he'll say the car is ready for sale.
